

How did we get here?

- Common Knowledge assignment: "to identify community information needs and community engagement opportunities"
- Jan 9 and Feb 19: Common Knowledge presentations to MCC
- Jan 22 MCC subcommittee identified two goals:
 - <u>Develop a better understanding of how the entire community feels</u> about high-priority issues, ideally through some quantitative data, as well as more kinds of conversations
 - Being able to <u>provide the community with more timely information</u> about topical issues (i.e. safety, evacuation, recreation, official planning processes)

The purpose of the survey is to reach a broad cross-section of people who live and work on the Midcoast to:

- Gather input about the high priority topic of mobility
- Gauge interest in a Midcoast newsletter and types of topics




What we have heard so far...

Younger people (18-35) are slightly underrepresented in our survey




What is your age? (n=418)

We're also short on responses from Spanish speakers




Language of survey (n=546)

84% of respondents live on the Midcoast




78% own their home




Do you rent or own the place where you live? (n=416)

El Granada has the most respondents, followed by Moss Beach and Montara

When it comes to getting around on the Coastside: What is working well for you? What is your biggest challenge?

What is working well for you?



- "Speed bumps on high trafficked neighborhood streets work well for me to remind myself to drive slow and mindfully and to feel safe when walking or riding a bike."
- "I love our bike paths".... "Wonderful recreation"
- "Walkability is improving and is my way of navigating on weekends (unless I need to shop)."
- "What works well is I do take the Samtrans bus every week and it is always on time."
- "My favorite walks are Moss Beach bluffs, coastal trail and Montara Mtn hikes."

What is your biggest challenge?



- "Biggest challenge is crossing Highway 1 on foot."
- "Traffic during peak hours & weekends on 92 & Hwy 1"
- "Taking the bus"..."Seniors are unable to get to the bus steps now existing."
- "The biggest challenge most of the time is pulling out onto the highway and beginning to drive on Hwy 1"....." Turning left onto Highway 1."
- "Safety no crosswalks with lights on Highway 1."
- "Sidewalks and unsafe street crossings a very difficult have two young children and the lack of sidewalks in El Granada makes walking around our neighborhood very difficult."
- "I take my daughter to school by bike twice a week, and we always have to be vigilant as there are very few bike lanes or shoulders to ride on aside from the Coastal Trail."

- "Start with more of these surveys."
- "Zoom meetings, regular public forums, guided feedback."
- "...new, informative content for MCC website on a regular basis"
- "Hold more County-level meetings that deal w/ Coastside issues, here on the Coastside"
- "publicity and advertising are important so we know when and where meetings will happen"
- "More outreach to the Spanishspeaking community."
